Heather Reception Manager

As a working mum of two teenage daughters, my day begins by trying to prise my children out of bed ready for school drop off before I head to the Surgery.

7.30-8am Surgery preparation— I make sure all the clinical rooms are well stocked, the sample fridge is ready, technology is working and my Reception team are ready to go for 8am.

8am is our busiest time, booking patients into the most appropriate slot and signposting others to services on offer.

9-12pm I am often juggling tasks from clinical and non clinical colleagues, sorting through the post as well as managing rotas and other staff administration. My other main focus of course is to make sure my team are well supported to deliver high quality care to our patients.

Time to catch up with our Practice Manager and address other issues of the day, attend meetings, liaise with District Nurses and other specialist teams. I may also be asked to assist the clinicians by acting as a chaperone if required.

I have worked in the NHS as a clinician in hospital settings and in the community; more recently specialising in mental health. I am in a unique position to understand both sides of the health service and hope that this benefits both staff and patients here at Shepley.

My working day finishes at 4pm, when I will be spending time with my Rugby mad family and ensuring they get to training on time which is often 4–5 times per week.





Flu—it's all about you!!

The nights will soon be drawing in and it's time to get winter ready. No need to worry, we've got you covered.

This year our flu and covid vaccination clinics start as early as lst September (pregnant women and young children).

All other eligible patients can get their vaccination at Shepley Health Centre from 1st October

Make sure your child is up to date with all their important immunisations. The child immunisations schedule has recently changed. Please speak to a member of the nursing team for further information.

HPV catch up:

The Human papillomavirus very common virus that can cause various health issues, such as genital warts and certain cancers. HPV vaccination can protect men and women against genital warts and other cancers of the genital areas and anus, as well as some mouth and throat (head and neck) cancers. We are currently inviting cohorts of unvaccinated males and females aged 16-24 years.

Repeat Prescriptions

You can order a repeat prescription in the following ways:

- 1. ORDER ONLINE it's quick and easy with the NHS app
- 2. Tick the items required on the white portion of your prescription then <u>hand it into reception</u>.

Please allow 48hours for prescription requests.
